New Djembe drumming lessons for Key Stage 2 – paid for by the PTA

lessons. Mrs Eames, a professional Djembe teacher comes to teach us different tones and pitches every Thursday, with each class enjoying a one hour lesson. Over the last three sessions, we have composed our own pieces, including adding everyone's ideas to the music she helped us to create.

Did you know that the Djembe drums we use come from Ghana, a country in Africa. The drums are hollow, allowing the sound to flow cleanly through them. Goat skin is wrapped tightly around the top making the beats we hear. Intricate carvings at the bottom complete the drum. Much effort goes into the drums causing them to be very expensive. We are very lucky to be learning this instrument and on Thursday 4th July we will perform to our parents and carers. See you then! Thank you PTA!

News from the Billingshurst and District Lions Club

50 Years Supporting Our Local Communities.

Billingshurst and District Lions Club was formed in 1974, by 20 members of our community, who wanted to offer their support wherever it was needed. The BDLC is an independent charity with national and international links to thousands of Lions Clubs and millions of Lions in over 200 countries around the world.

For many years now BDLC has worked very closely with our 10 local primary schools, offering a varied annual programme of support discussed in advance with the headteachers.

One example of the Lions involvement with schools is the annual book giveaway, where children can choose and keep a book of their choice. This took place last week in William Penn and was thoroughly enjoyed by the children.

We have also run art competitions, provided book bags, story sacks, classroom mats. Funded activity days, music lessons, outdoor learning facilities and tech equipment such as tablets.

The Lions also provide outdoor work parties, often in conjunction with parents, to help the school carry out repairs or improvements when required. We have worked with the RSPB, Woodland Trust and Little Lifesavers to bring new and exciting experiences to the children.

Our local primary schools have also helped and supported the Lions, arranging donations of children's clothes, promoting Lions events and supporting our shoebox appeal.

Finally, our greatest partnership has been the Lions ROAR education programme started in this area in 2017 by all 10 local primary schools, allowing children to 'think big and dream big' and come up with ideas 'changing the world for the better'.

ROAR has now become the Lions national education programme involving 25,000 children in 2023, started by BDLC and your school.

The ethos of Lions Clubs is to support needs in their own community, but with the ability to help or ask for help from Lions throughout the world. The motto of Lions Clubs is 'We Serve'.

BDLC is well known for its Charity Bookshop in Jengers Mead in Billingshurst, which has provided the backbone of its fundraising over the last 25 years, raising in excess of £700,000. The very first fundraising event was Christmas Carols, and this continues today with the Lions going out around Billingshurst and the surrounding villages for 16 nights leading up to Christmas.

President, Peter Coleman, says, "Over the years, apart from Schools, these funds have mainly been used to help the young, elderly and vulnerable in our communities, with some funds going to help national and international causes. But, none of this would be possible without the generous support we receive within Billingshurst and the surrounding District."
